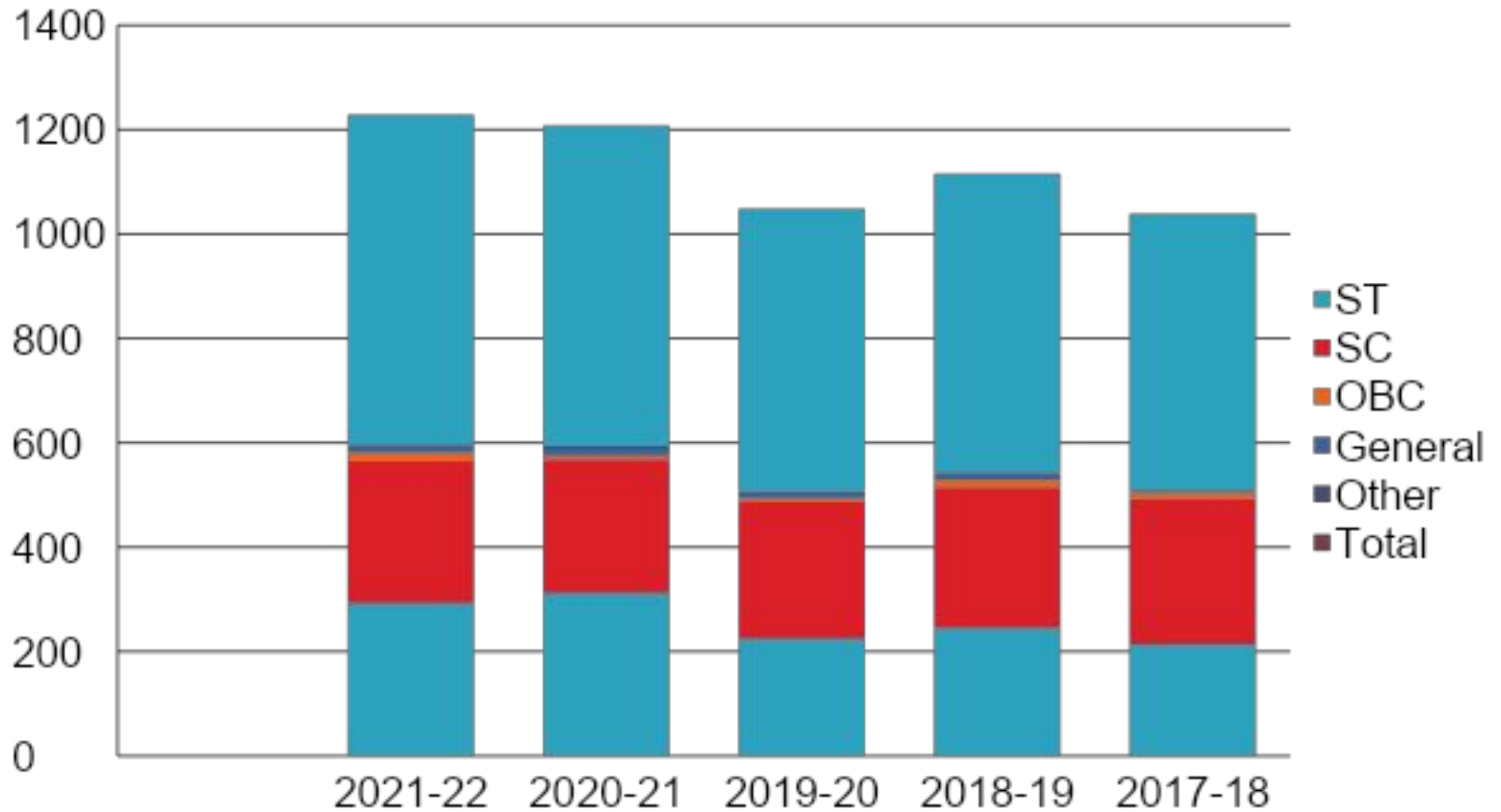

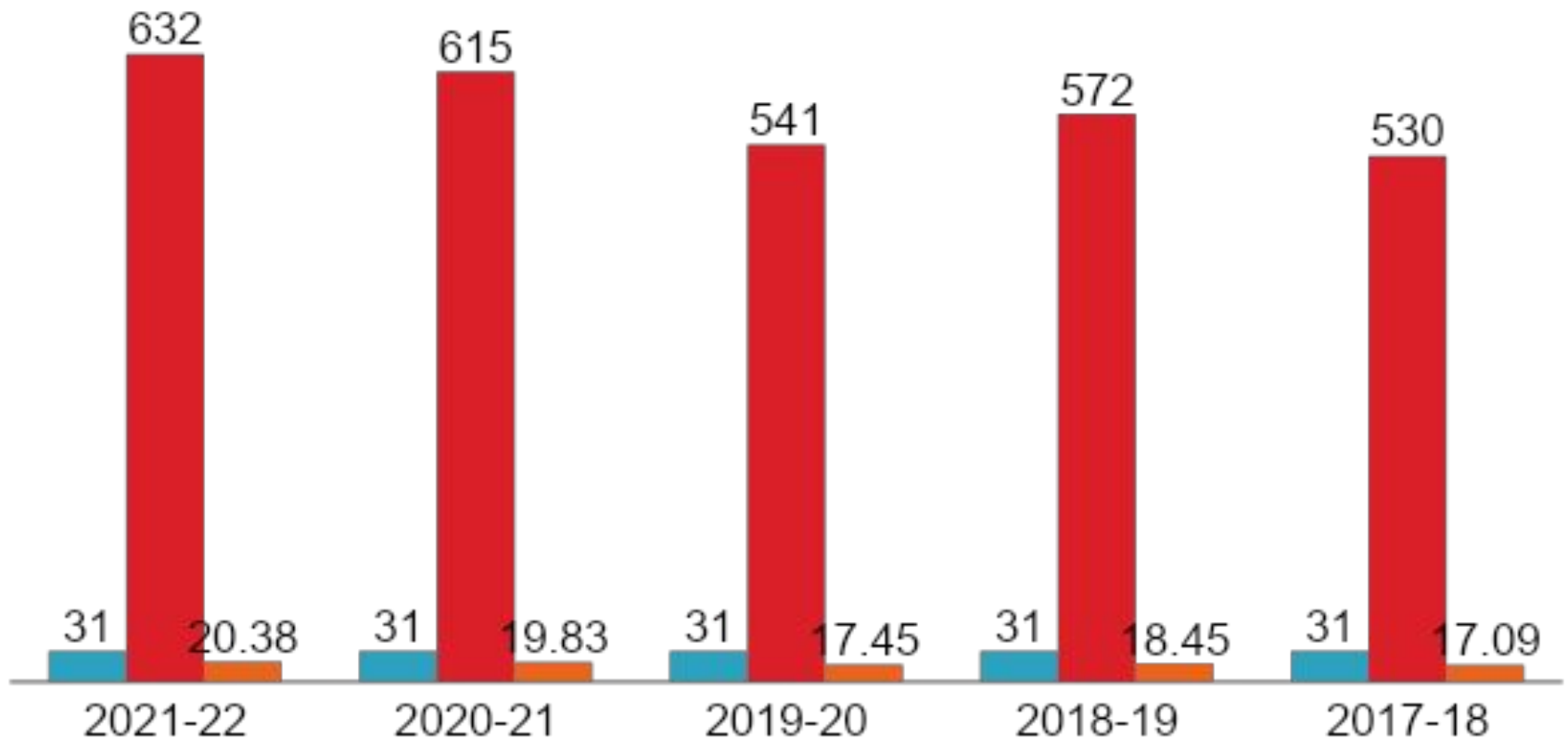

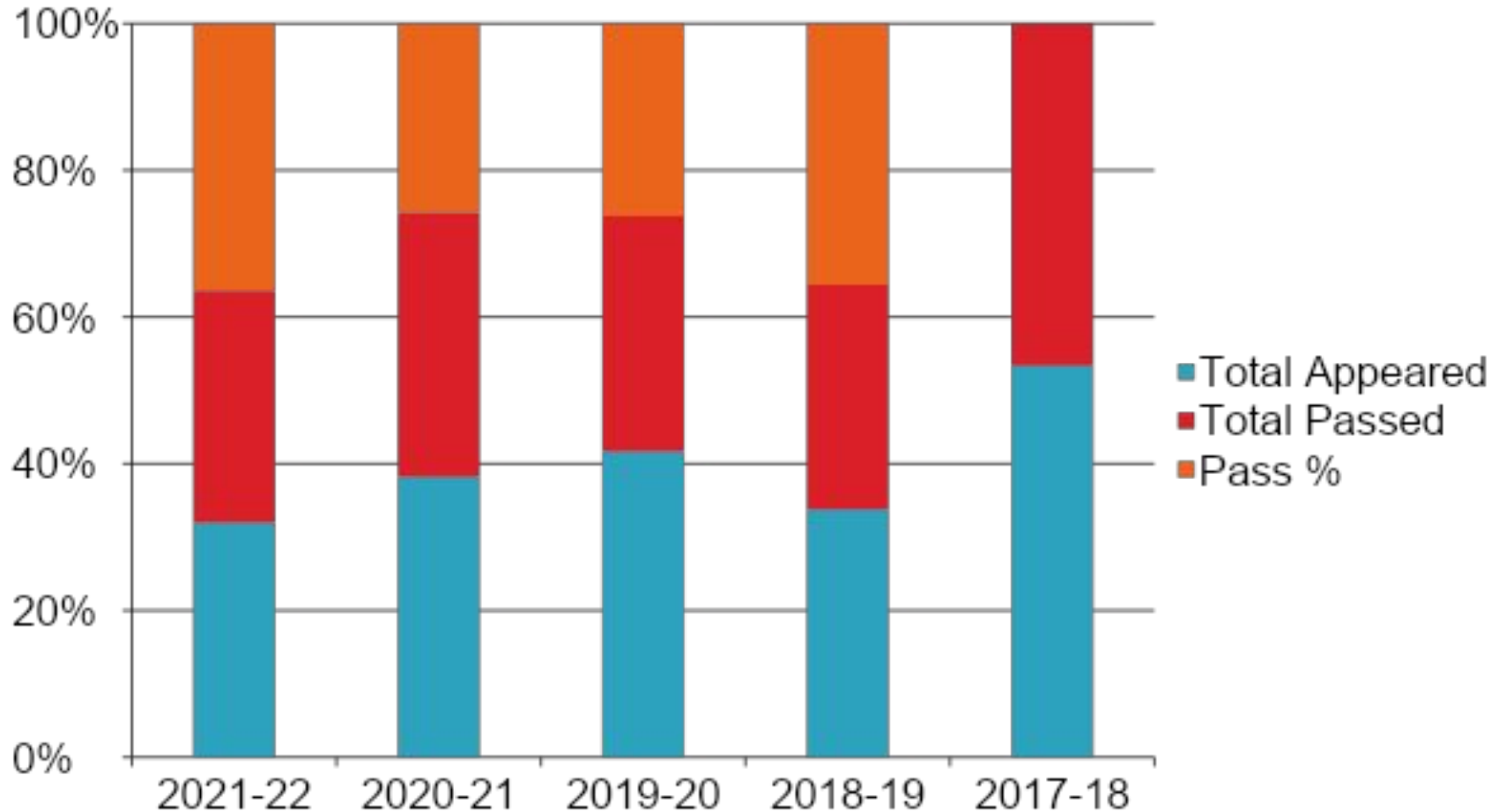

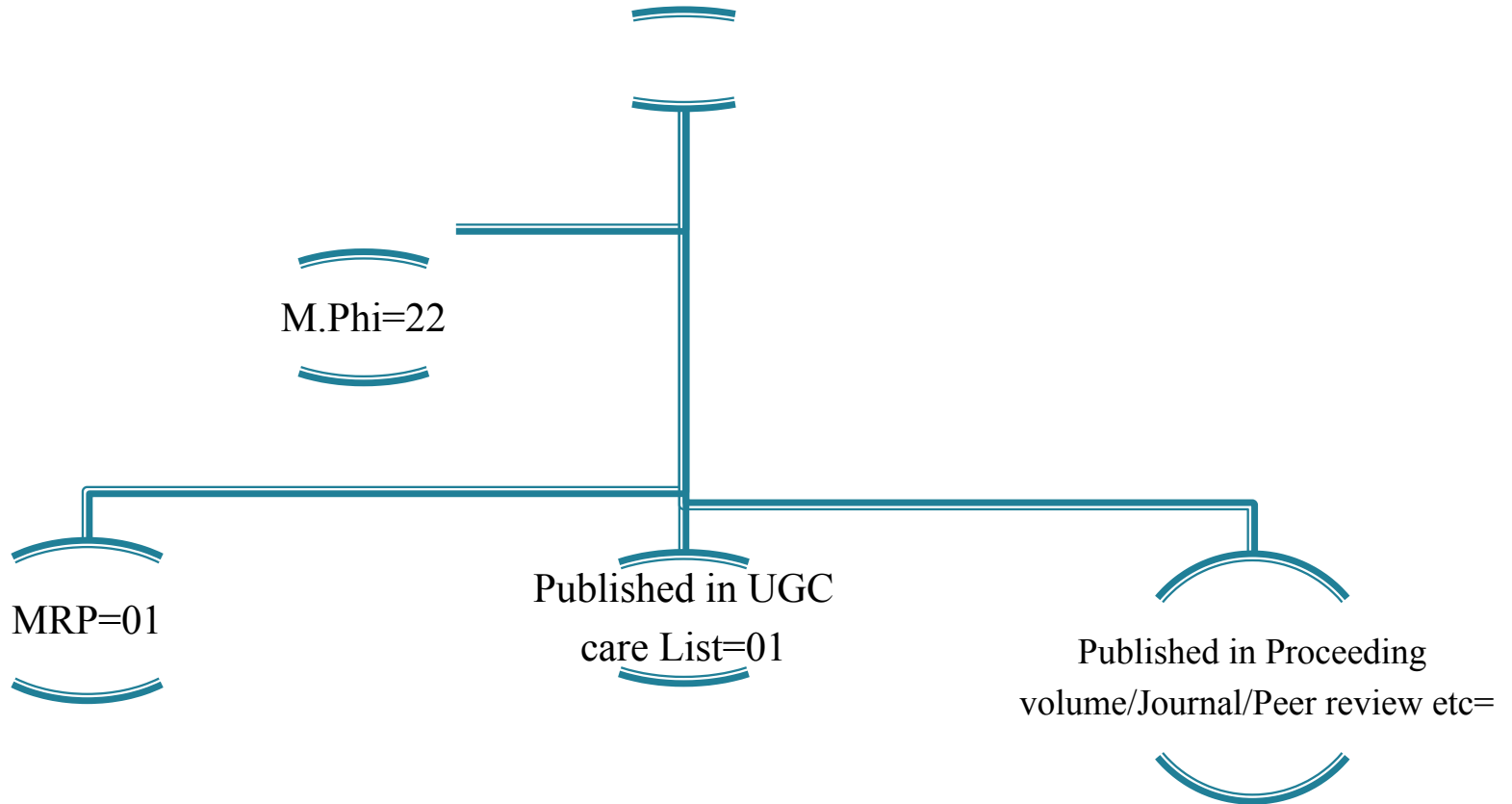

## Result Graphs of Last Five Years.

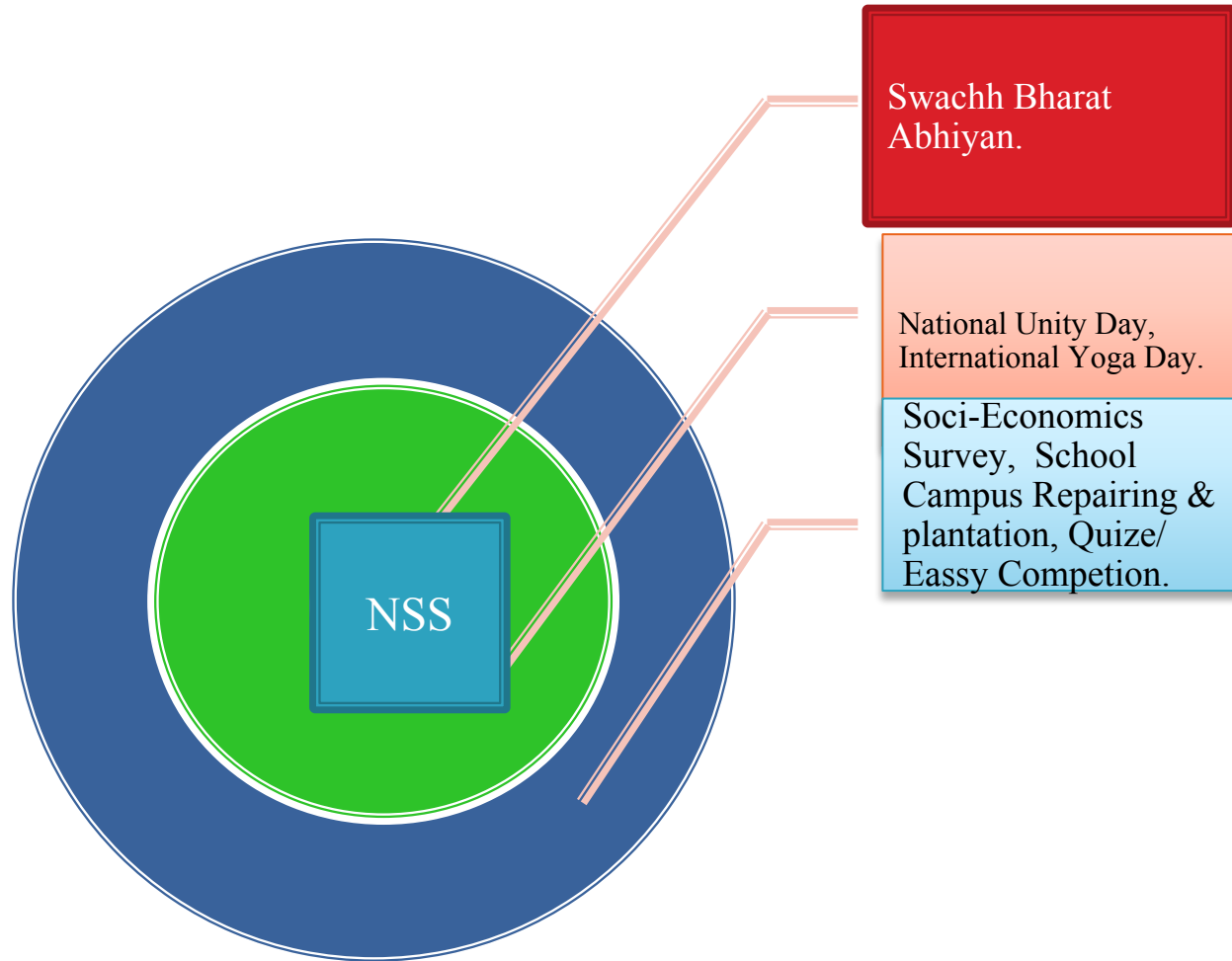

### **Environment friendly campus:-**



First aid kits, wheelchairs etc. are available for students and staff at Health Care Centre as well as Disaster Management Cell.
